An Example of Welcome and Inclusion - Walking Together

This is a short story of how a Nigerian family with great faith, seeking asylum, were moved by the Home Office from Wolverhampton into Leamington Spa not knowing any one, but within days found St. Peter's church, where they were welcomed and included in a number of parish activities with success

It started by a parishioner talking to them before the Sunday mass and inviting them to share a coffee with the parishioners after the service. This is where their story began and it was clear that they had numerous problems. We provided a listening ear and they were introduced to the parish priest

They were subsequently invited to attend the Community Hub which met every Tuesday in St. Peter's hall, organised by the "Pastimes" group. The welcome they received was outstanding, so much so they continued to attend every week. Parishioners who attend the Hub are a mixed group of mainly retired people, some with professional backgrounds, all of whom are very caring people. The net result was that several individuals became a constant source of support to the family

The family consisted of Father, and Mother who was nursing a baby of six months and a toddler of two years plus

Pastimes offered this family a place of safety where they able to relax, enjoy warm food, and the children had space to play as their accommodation was limited. In addition, their warmth enabled them to form friendships with a number of the parishioners

As Christmas approached the family received small cash gifts from a collection at Pastimes, from two individual parishioners and from St. Peter's Aid for the Needy (SPAN)

Meanwhile, the family approached Fr. Stephen to have the baby baptised, and the baptism took place after Christmas. The godparents were two parishioners who regularly attended Pastimes. A local Nigerian couple also attended the service

The family were receiving support from Coventry Refugee and Migrant Centre through a parishioner of Our Lady's parish in Lillington, who was also a member of the SVP. On one occasion he arranged for the family to use the kitchen of Our Lady's parish hall to cook and to enjoy a Nigerian meal. It was a wonderful treat for the family

On February 16th the family received notice from the Home Office that they were to move out of Leamington to Lancashire. This is the plight of refugees, the constant moving on! This time the move is into a house which will be much better for the family than their previous accommodation. The SVP member took steps to alert the SVP in the town they were going to, to welcome them there

They will be sadly missed by many and, as one parishioner said, "They have enriched our lives with their presence"

May God protect them as they take another step in their long journey to find peace in this country of ours

The SPAN Lenten appeal provides supermarket vouchers for local families and continues our support in the Holy Land for Beit el Nour (House of Light and Hope) in Lebanon

In recent years civil society in Lebanon has faced crises: political insecurity, a deteriorating economy, depreciation of the Lebanese lira, a major explosion, the overflow of violence from disputes with Israel. Hundreds of thousands of displaced Syrian families are still live in Lebanese areas, and thousands of Palestinian refugees are living in camps. The country is also affected by

the migration of Lebanese youth and families searching for better life conditions abroad. These factors have produced an increased demand for support for vulnerable children, marginalized young girls and women, women imprisoned, and families in need of help

However, House of Light and Hope are able to ensure the education of hundreds of children and their protection from risks and ensure for them and their families the psycho social support needed. They also support hundreds of young girls and women victims of violence and exploitation, and the imprisoned in three women prisons, through their empowerment and social rehabilitation and reintegration. They continue to ensure hot meals for children who come every day to study in their centres. These children belong to families who no longer have the ability to provide the basic needs

The annual report of House of Light and Hope said, "We would like to thank our friends who provided a variety of critical donations in 2023, which were distributed to hundreds of families who live under the poverty line. The donations included medications, stationery, milk for children, food baskets, hygiene kits, blankets, clothes, shoes."

Study Group for Sunday Readings

In January's EXTRA I described the background of this group and how we expected to run it. First, we read the first and second readings and the Gospel of the following Sunday's mass and consider them in the context in which they were written and how they were understood by the writer and by his intended audience. Then we reflect in a controlled (Ignatian) way on what God is saying to us today in those passages of scripture. In January, I invited anyone who would like to join the group on a regular basis to contact me

We have been running for seven weeks since 19 January with about eight regular members, meeting at 11am each Friday in the Davenport Room of St Peter's Parish Hall. I am now extending the invitation to any who would like to join occasionally without a commitment to come every week, to experience this approach to the scriptures

One of our members recently said that seeing the way the Sunday readings throw light on each other provides a valuable dimension missing from traditional Bible study. But I believe the most important part of our meetings is our sharing what each one of us believes God is saying to us personally through these readings
