

May, Mary's Month

The keeping of May as Mary's month is a well-known Catholic devotion. In fact, every day of the week and every month is dedicated to one important mystery of our salvation or to a particular saint – Saturday is Mary's day, for example.

But why should May be given to Mary? Perhaps first we need to understand a little about Our Lady herself. The Scriptures clearly tell us about Mary's uniqueness. Gabriel greets her by calling her 'full of grace' and Elizabeth says she is 'blessed among women'. This comes, of course, from Mary's unique role in God's plan for our salvation, her vocation being the Mother of Jesus, the Word made flesh.



This is a vocation she embraced: 'Let it be done to me according to your word' she said to Gabriel. Mary's faith, her trust in God's plan, is immense. She was given no outline of her Son's life, no details of how she would be affected by this, she accepted God's will in simple faith.

To go back to the Old Testament, we may see Mary's uniqueness revealed there too. In the first book of the Kings, the mother of the Israelite King is given great honour and is even one through whom his subjects may make requests of the King himself. She was a trusted confidante and advisor and is thus an exalted and powerful figure in the royal court.

This tradition is continued in the Kingdom established by Jesus Himself. Mary does not have divine powers of herself but rather a profoundly deep relationship with her Son. We ask her to pray for us – 'pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death' and present our requests to her Son, the King. Furthermore, Jesus Himself named her as our mother from the cross. How could she who had such a faith in God's plan for us in Jesus, not pray for us because it was for us that she said 'Yes!' to God's plan for her.

So, in acknowledging Mary's unique role in the salvation of the world, the Church naturally gives her due honour. Some Christian groups pay scant regard to Mary and Catholics have been criticised for holding the ancient beliefs of the Church. Yet even in that gospel passage where Christ describes as most blessed those who 'hear the word of God and keep it', He must have been thinking of His mother whose hearing and keeping of the Word is unmatched.

But why May? As in so many traditions, the exact answer is uncertain. Originally, there was of course no special month for Mary, and it was only in the 12th century or so that May devotions happened in many places. There would be processions, crownings of statues and a more intense focus on Mary. Part of this may have been in thanksgiving for the end to outbreaks of disease or a calling of a particularly dissolute place back to the Gospel. Yet May is the time of freshness, new growth, and of the promise of coming fruitfulness. These, too, naturally point to Our Lady, whose carrying of the unborn Jesus represents all these things to perfection.

As a model disciple of her Son, Mary provides both example and prayer for us who also seek to be disciples of that same Son. May her prayers and our devotion this month lead us all closer to the blessed fruit of her womb, Jesus.

Our Lady and St Wulstan

Southam's parish will be celebrating several significant anniversaries this year and, although it is outside our cluster of parishes, it is still very near and part of our deanery.

One important bit of history is that St Wulstan was born within the parish, as son of the then Parish Priest in 1008 at Long Itchington. His early studies were at the monasteries in Evesham and Peterborough. After some time as a clerk at Worcester, he then studied for the priesthood and was ordained in 1038. He became a Benedictine monk at Worcester Cathedral Priory and then Bishop of Worcester in 1062.

St Wulstan is the first English bishop known to have made systematic visitations of his diocese. He was anxious that country people should have the chance of going to Mass and encouraged the building of churches on rural manors. An outstanding success of his episcopate was the abolition

of the trade in slaves from Bristol to Viking Ireland. He survived the Norman Conquest to become a trusted adviser of William the Conqueror. St Wulstan died in 1095 at the age of 87.

In 1876, ten Sisters of the Poor Child Jesus, exiled from Germany, were settled at Southam and established an orphanage and school as well as a temporary church. In 1884 it was decided that their small iron chapel, which had been brought here from Cardiff in 1878, should also serve as a mission. In 1886 a resident priest was appointed and the presbytery was built. In 1898 a second, larger iron church was brought here, this time from Birmingham. Large new convent buildings were also added about the same time, from designs by a German architect.



In 1913, Charles Shaw, the brother of James Shaw of Bourton Hall, left a bequest of £5,000 for a new church. This paid the entire cost of the present building. Construction was delayed by the Great War, and the church did not open until 1925. A pleasant small Italo-Byzantine church, the exterior is unassuming yet the interior with its round-arched ceiling is well-proportioned. The sanctuary and Lady Chapel were gradually adorned with Italianate wall paintings by Sister Mary Sales. The church was consecrated by Archbishop Grimshaw on 14 May 1956. Sadly the church has lost much of the painted decoration which once enriched the east end.

In 1972, it was handed over to the diocese, which also acquired the presbytery.

CAFOD’s Sudan Update

April marked three years since the conflict began in Sudan. Our brothers and sisters are facing what is officially the worst humanitarian crisis in the world. You may remember that parishes across England and Wales supported Sudan through emergency collections two years ago. Violence in Sudan has sadly expanded and now 13.6 million people have fled their homes. While many other charities have been forced to leave, our Church partners remain to support families in Sudan. This has become a terrible, long-term emergency. And yet news broadcasts report so little of the suffering.



Families are still on the move, often for days and weeks at a time in search of safety, walking through bush paths because the main roads are controlled by armed groups. Mothers carry children on their backs, young women and men search desperately for water where wells have long run dry. Many children and women have lost their lives during these weeks of walking without food and water.

Those who reach displacement camps often arrive malnourished, dehydrated and carrying horrific stories of rape and abuse at the hands of armed men. Hunger is everywhere, diseases are breaking out and exploitation, trafficking, and child protection violations are rampant.

And yet, amid this suffering, I have heard of courage and solidarity. Our partner Caritas Sudan, alongside other local organisations, is providing food, cash assistance, safe water, nutrition, and more. They are saving lives every day. But the gap between overwhelming needs and available support is massive.

This is why regular monthly giving is so vital. Monthly gifts are an act of steady love for our neighbours, a way of saying: “*We will not abandon you; we will stand with you until peace is restored.*” It is like the Good Samaritan who stopped, cared for the wounded man, paid for his treatment, and promised to give more if needed. That is the kind of faithful solidarity Sudan needs today.
