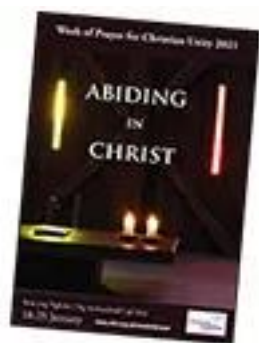

## Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 18th-25th January "Abiding in Christ"

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is traditionally observed from the 18th to the 25th January and this year it has been prepared by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland.

The theme that was chosen, "Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit", is based on John 15:1-17 and expresses Grandchamp Community's vocation to prayer, reconciliation and unity in the Church and the human family.

Today the community has fifty sisters, all women from different generations, Church traditions, countries and continents. In their diversity the sisters are a living parable of communion. They remain faithful to a life of prayer, life in community and the welcoming of guests. The sisters share the grace of their monastic life with visitors and volunteers who go to Grandchamp for a time of retreat, silence, healing or in search of meaning.

There is a booklet for us to use: 'Abiding in Christ' with **reflections and prayers for each of the eight days**, as well as 'Go and Do' action points by Christian Aid. It can be obtained from

## How can we learn from 2020? Let's be ambitious

What a year 2020 has been! No doubt it has brought a lot of sadness to many, whether that is the loss of a loved one, loss of a job or business or the loss of social contact. However, it has also shown our resilience and our ability to adjust to new ways of doing things in a short period of time.

Take working from home. My office job previously required me to print lengthy documents in the belief that I could not read and compare them on a screen. I have been working from home since 23 March and have not printed a single document since then. I have learnt to use digital technology more effectively, prepared digital court bundles and arranged for contracts to be signed electronically. Court hearings which would have required travel to Birmingham or London have been held by telephone and meetings I used to attend across the county now take place on my computer screen – often with repeated yells of "you're on mute"!

These are changes that I know will continue to some extent when "things go back to normal" and I am certain they would not have happened as quickly as they did had it not been for the pandemic.

## So how can we learn from 2020?

The impact of climate change needs us to act urgently if we want to ensure that the generations to come can benefit from the wonderful world we have the privilege to occupy. Let's be ambitious in our New Year's resolutions safe in the knowledge that we are more adaptable than we thought. Whether that is reducing the amount of meat we eat, using the car less or switching to green energy providers. I know I am going to try and be ambitious – I've done it before....

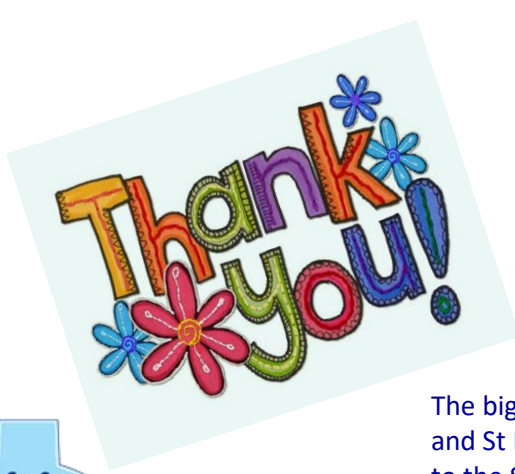

It is likely to be over twice the amount raised last year. This year has been one that many families have found very difficult and will be so welcomed.

Heartfelt messages of thanks have come back to us via **our schools, SVP, the clergy, and the local Children's Centres and Hubs**, all of whom have helped identify those in need in our community and assisted in the distribution of vouchers. Thanks to Jean Feely in overseeing this project.

At the December SPAN Meeting, it was decided that, since there was more funding not yet banked, donations to the families identified by the schools **should be continued into the new year**. Because of the generosity of Catholic Leamington people and friends we will be able to give more grocery vouchers to help local families in January, when times will be quite hard. Extra funding would also go to the Children's Centres and Brunswick Hub. Also £ 150 of this money would be used to help the Salvation Army Christmas Dinner and £ 150 for the Chapter One hostel Christmas Dinner that SPAN gives to annually.

SPAN hope you all had a meaningful Christmas, are enjoying a peaceful New Year, and have a hopeful start to 2021.
