A silent vigil to support the right to protest Leamington Town Hall on Saturday 12 June from 11-12

Warwick Quakers are holding a silent vigil to support the right to protest, which the Police and Crime Bill seeks to limit and criminalise.

Many religious and civil groups are extremely concerned about this threat to our civil liberties. Static gatherings can be treated the same as marches, with severe penalties to leaders of gatherings. The bill also seeks to criminalise the way of life of gypsies and travellers. Quakers nationally have written to the Secretary of State for Justice, and to the Home Secretary, to object to the bill. The home secretary will have the power to decide whether a protest is "disruptive".

We remember the many, many social issues which were eventually improved by protest. Abolition of slavery. Votes for Women. Racial justice. Gay rights. The need for action on climate.

Warwick Quakers will hold the vigil outside Leamington Town Hall on Saturday 12 June from 11 to 12. They will bring chairs and sit in a circle, holding placards saying "Quakers oppose the Police and Crime Bill" and "Quakers. A silent vigil to support the right to protest". We have council and police permission. Everyone is so welcome to come, but only 30 can protest.

### Can you help?

The Saturday Friendship Group is one way in which Catholic Leamington is responding to the problem of homelessness and social deprivation in Leamington. We are partnered with the Salvation Army Way Ahead Project for this work. Our main aim is to make sure that there are enough volunteers on Saturdays to enable visitors to drop into the Centre in Church Street for a brunch, which in normal times they make for themselves, have an opportunity to socialise and obtain help and advice.

Those of us who have been involved feel it is a very worthwhile and meaningful activity, recognising everyone's dignity while helping to provide some basic needs.

Now, we find ourselves in need of more volunteers, both on Saturdays and also during the rest of the week.

Yvonne Mckinnon, the Project Manager, is currently recruiting to build up the volunteer base, in preparation for more normal working. So, we are appealing for people to step forward, to have a chat about what is involved. Volunteers usually go in once a fortnight for 2-3

Cll. Jonathan Chilvers, Warwickshire County
Councillor for Brunswick Ward and leader of the
Green Party group was invited to the Justice and
Peace Zoom meeting for us to find out what the
Councils were doing locally to address the Climate
Emergency. This is what he said in responding to
the question we put to him ...



#### Can you tell us the best way we can influence each councils involved?

- Leamington Council budget £300,000
- Warwick District Council budget £20m
- Warwickshire County Council budget £350m
- Figure out which powers each council has and try to put pressure on. Decisions are often made behind the scenes; by the time of a public meeting, decisions have already been made. So, it's important to find out agendas and get in early.
- Jonathan said we should contact our own Parish/Town, District, or County Councillor and ask questions and give opinions." [Note: find out who at <a href="https://www.writetothem.com">www.writetothem.com</a>]

## Current government in 2015 withdrew the code for sustainable homes. How far does this affect the council's ability to reflect the climate crisis in climate regulations?

The reason the bill was withdrawn in 2015 was because of building companies putting pressure on the government to cut the red tape on building regulations. Councils now have less of a say as to where houses are built. W.D.C. needs to challenge the government. The houses now being built are of poorer quality than 10 years ago. Also in last week's Queen's speech there were further relaxations proposed. The few homes built by WDC are passive house standards. Also if planning decisions go to appeal it is likely that Councils will lose and this will cost them, hence lack of local autonomy.

# How can the council ensure that old buildings like Leamington Library are heated adequately if W.D.C. is aiming to be carbon neutral by 2030?

Older buildings are very expensive to insulate. The council need to implement a major plan to cover so many older buildings in historic Leamington.

## Does the council think that the extra demand for electricity for electric cars can be generated by sustainable means?

Councils need to have a collective answer. The problems are solvable, but councils should be looking at other forms of sustainable transport, like cycling and walking not just improving roads.

#### What are the policies that you would particularly like to see implemented?

- The council know what they should be doing, and it all depends on successful lobbying!
- £40m should be spent on improving walking and cycling routes.
- Never again install a gas boiler in a school [as these will be obsolete in a few years' time]
- There is work ongoing on biodiversity and species mapping.
- Pensions fund disinvestment -- £50 million of the pension fund is in fossil fuel companies such as Shell. (Warwickshire mid league table on this)
- A joined up policy on natural flood management programmes.

#### What policies are likely to be voted through?

- Again depends on successful lobbying!
- Cycle paths, school zones, 20m.p.h. limits, electric charging points.

#### How is local recycling to be improved?

- W.D.C. is joining up [with Stratford] to build a huge new recycling factory in 2022.
- Most recycling does not go to landfill.

#### A final question was asked about harnessing the energy from the weir in Jephson Gardens.

- This has been suggested before and it really needs some local group to take up the challenge.
- Also mentioned was the need for more charging points. Supermarkets seem the obvious area as people
  could recharge their cars while doing their weekly shopping, and possibly large supermarkets could bear the
  cost?


#### **HOW DID WE DO IN 2020?**

### **OUR HOPES FOR THE G7 SUMMIT**

The eyes of the world are on the UK this year as we host two historic global summits



It's the first time the UK has hosted this summit since 2012. It will also be the first visit to Britain by President Joe Biden.

Lots of our supporters will remember campaigning ahead of previous G7 meetings the UK has hosted to tell world leaders they're hungry for change, to drop the debt or to make poverty history.

This year's G7 meeting is one of the most important yet.

Our Government has said it wants to use this gathering of world leaders in Cornwall this month to work out how to "build back better" from the pandemic. That's a vision we share. But it requires decision makers to include everyone in recovery plans, ensuring that people in the world's poorest communities are not - as Pope Francis warns is often the case - treated as an "afterthought".

It means G7 leaders need to cancel debts of countries struggling with both the coronavirus crisis and a debt crisis and push private banks to do the same, freeing up urgently needed money to tackle the health and economic impacts of the pandemic.

It means governments need to protect communities whose lands and livelihoods are damaged and destroyed by irresponsible businesses, making it the responsibility of companies around the world to prevent human rights abuses throughout their supply

And it means Boris Johnson must show global leadership in bringing world leaders together around an ambitious plan to keep temperature rises below the disastrous 1.5 degree threshold.
