"Having been baptised and raised as a Catholic, I had allowed my faith to slip as an adult. I was very pleased indeed to discover that St Peter's held "Come and See" sessions, which I attended weekly from September 2014. I found the whole experience to be welcoming and positive and found myself looking forward to the weekly meetings. It enabled me to renew my faith in the company of like minded others and I have really benefitted from the sense of community and support offered.
